A Tanzanian woman goes to a health facility. What can she expect?



Hard to Reach

She and $\frac{3}{4}$ of the mothers in her village will travel more than 5km to a health facility



Worker Shortage

A 50/50 chance of having her baby delivered by a skilled attendant



Medicine Shortage

Only 2 out of 5 health facilities will have the drugs she needs



Poor Outcomes

A 40% chance of dying from complications of childbirth



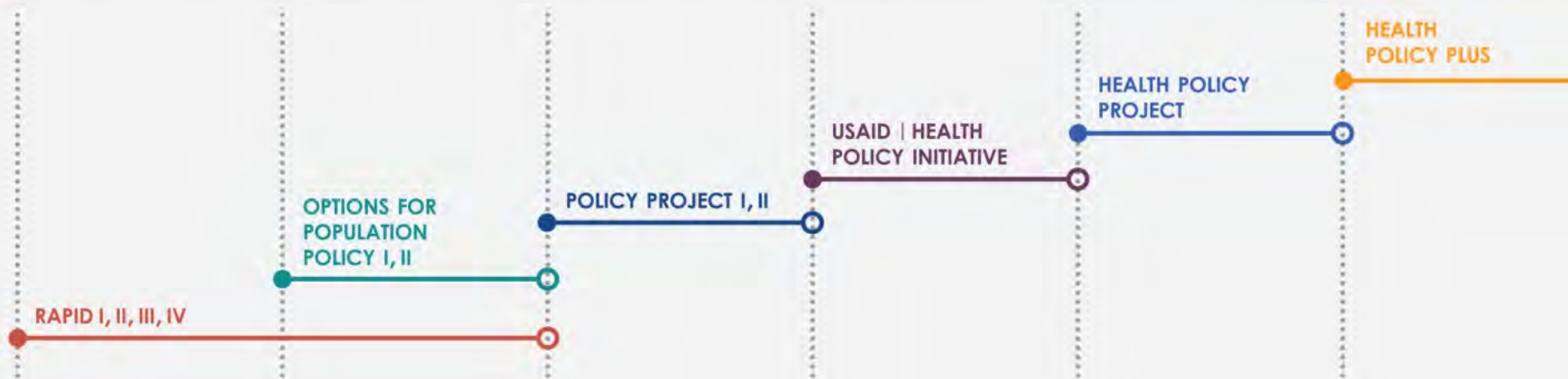
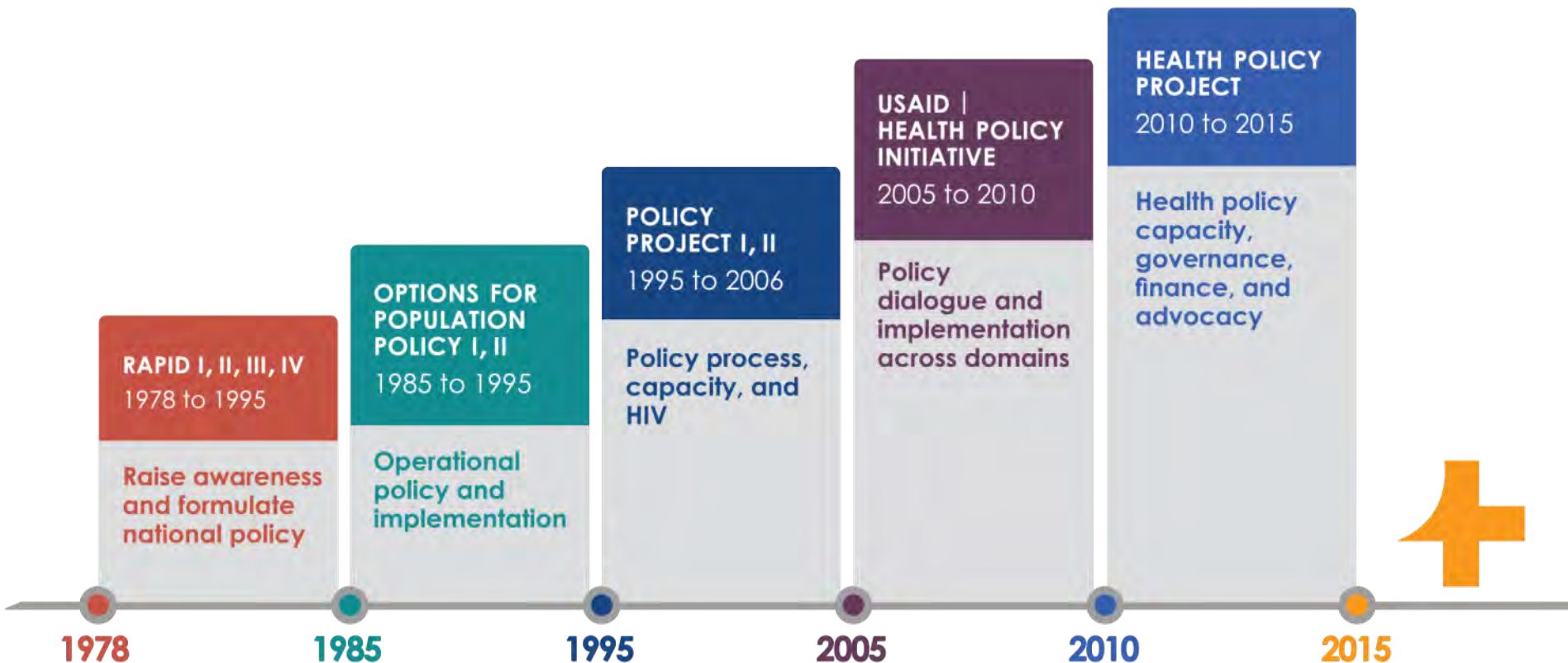
Lack of Services

Only 1 out of 5 health facilities will have emergency obstetrics care

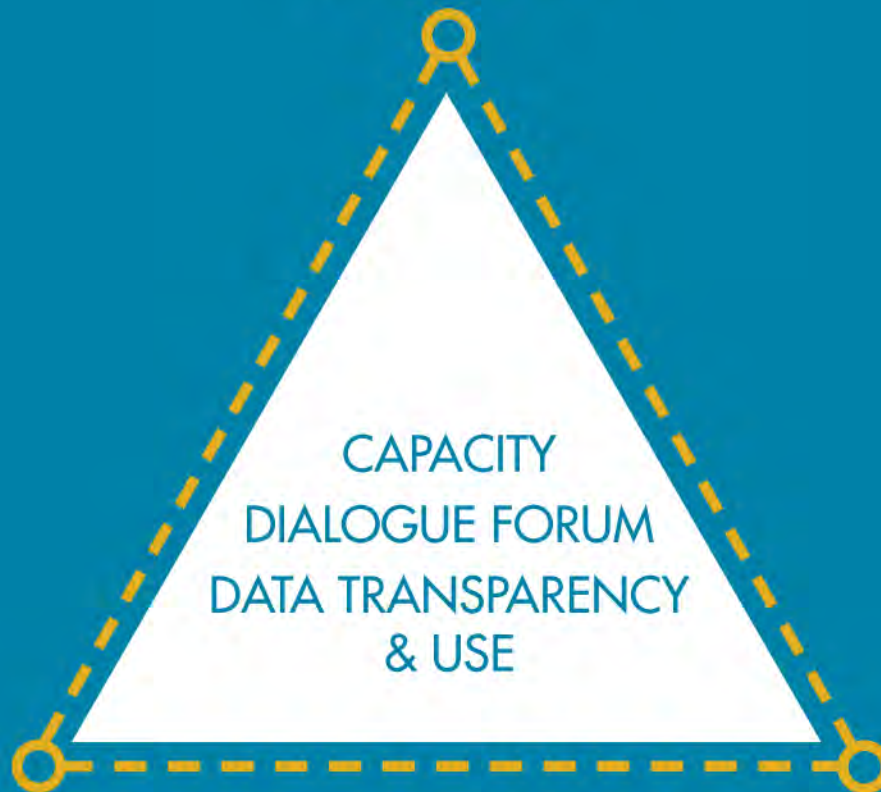
GUATEMALA GOVERNANCE IN ACTION

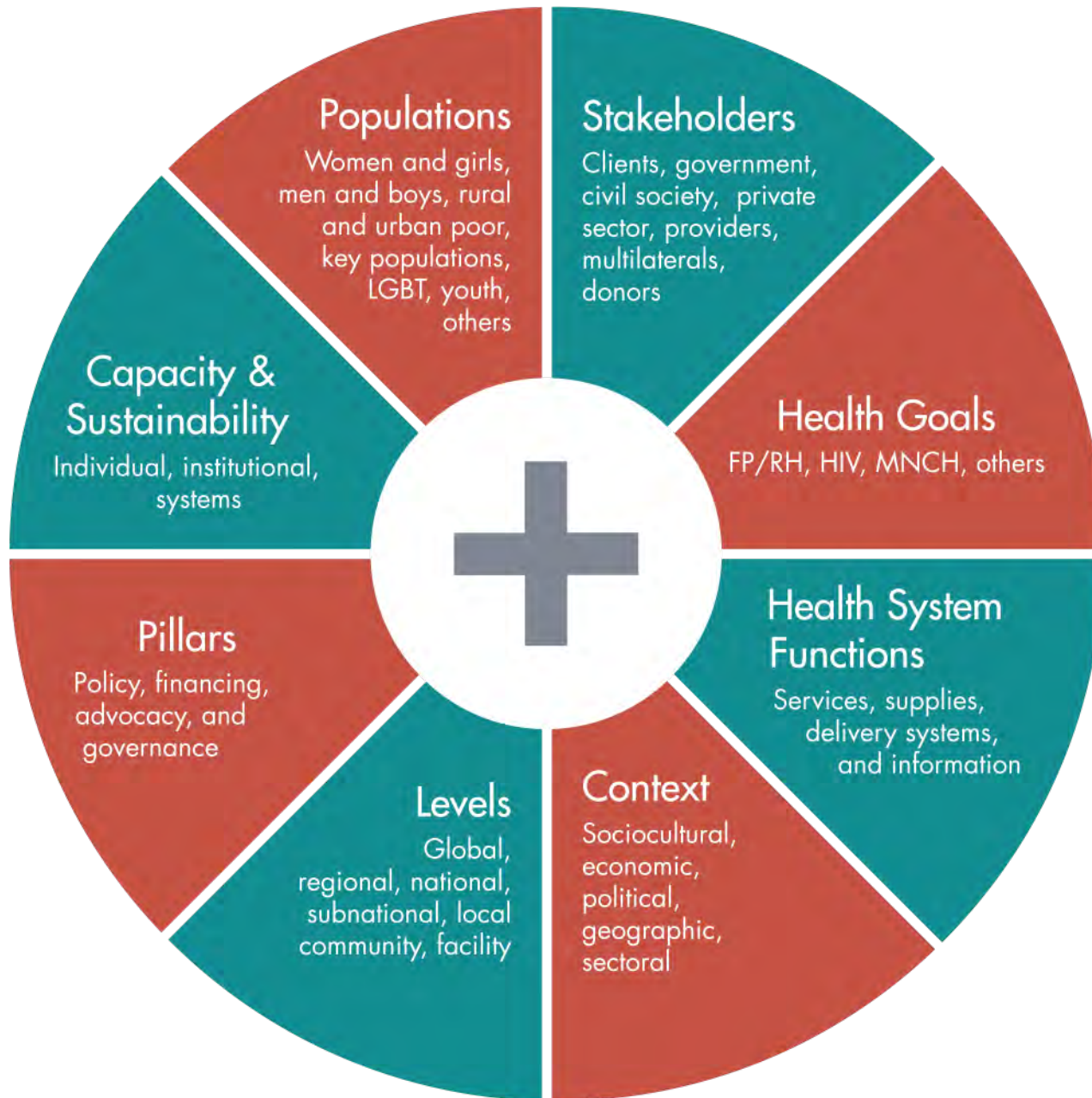
